The **Champlain Society 2023 volume** offers an overview of Canadian Jewish history up to 1923, for the first time from the point of references to its most salient and significant historical sources. This collection includes documentation from diverse archives in many languages, which account for the evolution of Canadian Jewry over three centuries and through a wide array of contexts and circumstances. This volume, the first of two on this subject, includes sources that have never been published before and highlights the activities, concerns and experiences of individuals that have not been heard until now.

Land acknowledgement

We recognize that many Indigenous Nations have longstanding relationships with the territories upon which York University campuses are located that precede the establishment of York University. York University acknowledges its presence on the traditional territory of many Indigenous Nations. The area known as Tkaronto has been care taken by the Anishinabek Nation, the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, and the Huron-Wendat. It is now home to many First Nation, Inuit and Métis communities. We acknowledge the current treaty holders, the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. This territory is subject of the Dish with One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement to peaceably share and care for the Great Lakes region.



Reconnaissance du territoire

L'Université York reconnaît que de nombreuses nations autochtones entretiennent des relations de longue date avec les territoires sur lesquels sont situés les campus de l'Université York, relations qui précèdent la création de l'Université York. L'Université York reconnaît sa présence sur le territoire traditionnel de nombreuses nations autochtones. La région connue comme Tkaronto a été préservée par la nation anishinabek, la Confédération Haudenosaunee et les Hurons-Wendats. Elle est désormais le foyer d'un grand nombre de communautés de Premières Nations, d'Inuits et de Métis. Nous reconnaissons les titulaires actuels du traité, la Première Nation des Mississaugas de New Credit. Ce territoire est soumis au traité de la ceinture wampum (« Dish with One Spoon »), entente définissant le partage et la préservation pacifiques de la région des Grands Lacs.

WELCOME | BIENVENUE

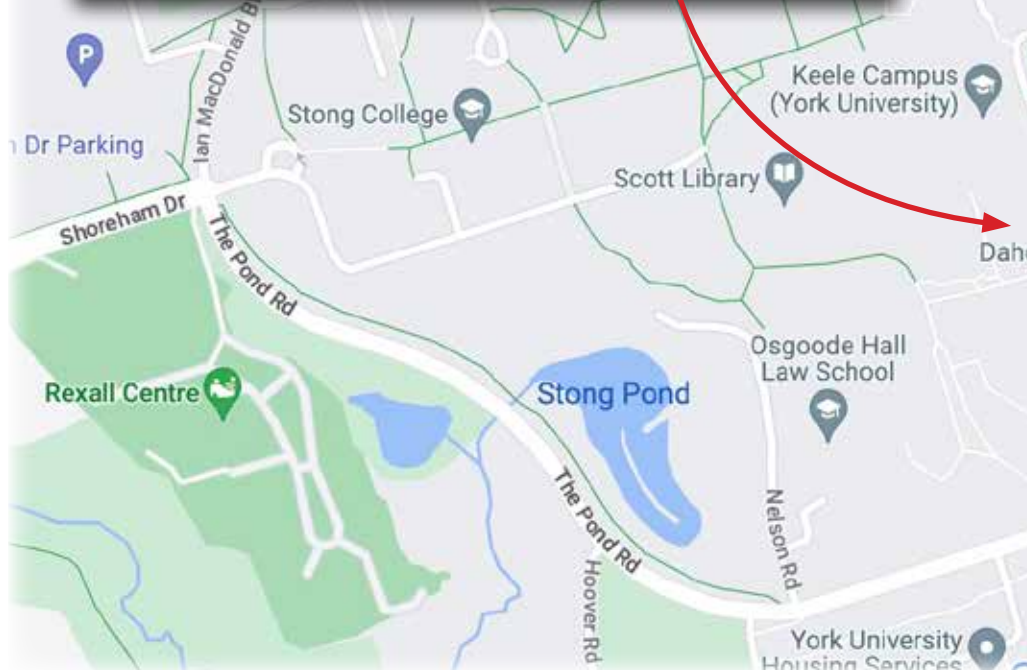
On behalf of York University's community of historians, welcome to the Canadian Historical Association's 102nd Annual Conference. We are meeting in-person for the first time since 2019. The past four years have been difficult ones for people around the world. The global Covid-19 pandemic has wrought suffering, death and grief; it also revealed significant inequities of health and health services along the lines of race, region, age, and class and has exposed profound disagreements over the legitimacy and efficacy of public policy. Over the same years, struggles to combat anti-Black racism, defend reproductive rights, and stop violence against queer, trans and gender-non-binary people have crossed international borders, as have concerns over climate change, war and the transnational refugee crisis. Canadians have been asked to confront the damage done to Indigenous families and communities by residential schools, racialized adoption practices, and sexual violence. This year's CHA conference, with the theme "Difficult Histories in Global Context," is an opportunity for scholars to bring historical insights to these and other social and political issues. The opportunity to meet, to share our research and listen to one another is a gift we cherish. We are looking forward to seeing you all here at York.

Au nom de la communauté des historien.ne.s de l'Université York, nous vous souhaitons la bienvenue à la 102e Conférence annuelle de la Société historique du Canada. Nous nous réunissons en personne pour la première fois depuis 2019. Les quatre dernières années ont été difficiles pour les populations du monde entier. La pandémie mondiale de Covid-19 a provoqué des souffrances, des morts et des deuils ; elle a également révélé d'importantes inégalités en matière de santé et de services de santé selon la race, la région, l'âge et de la classe sociale, et a mis en lumière de profonds désaccords sur la légitimité et l'efficacité des politiques publiques.
